Federal Grants Newsletter

Department of Health and Human Services

Children's Mental Health Initiative

- Closing Date: **April 20, 2026**
- Description: The purpose of the Children's Mental Health Initiative program is to provide comprehensive community mental health services to children, youth, and young adults, birth through age 21 with a serious emotional disturbance, which may include efforts to identify and serve children at risk, and their families.
- Eligibility: Eligibility is statutorily limited to State governments; governmental units within political subdivisions of a state (e.g. county, city, town); and any Indian tribe or tribal organization.

Assisted Outpatient Treatment Program

- Closing Date: **April 20, 2026**
- Description: The purpose of this program is to facilitate the implementation of Assisted Outpatient Treatment for adults with serious mental illness. Recipients are expected to implement the Assisted Outpatient Treatment program, working with civil courts, community partners, and other entities to support community-based treatment for adults with SMI who meet criteria for AOT.
- Eligibility: Eligibility is statutorily limited to counties, cities, mental health systems (including mental health authorities), mental health courts, or any other entities with authority under the law of the State in which the applicant is located to implement, monitor and oversee assisted outpatient programs.

Innovative Research in Cancer Nanotechnology (IRCN; R01 Clinical Trial Not Allowed)

- Closing Date: **May 4, 2026**
- Description: The National Cancer Institute (NCI) encourages applications promoting transformative discoveries in cancer biology and/or oncology through the use of nanotechnology. Proposed projects should address major barriers in cancer biology and/or oncology using nanotechnology and should emphasize mechanistic studies toward fundamental understanding of nanomaterial and/or nanodevice interactions with biological systems. These studies should be

performed in the context of research concerning the delivery of nanoparticles and/or nanodevices to desired and intended cancer targets in vivo and/or characterization of detection and diagnostic devices in vitro. IRCN awards are expected to produce fundamental knowledge to aid future and more informed development of nanotechnology-based cancer interventions.

- Eligibility: State governments; City or township governments; county governments; special district governments; Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized); Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments); Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; public and State controlled institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; small businesses; independent school districts; others (see full NOFO for more information).

[Understanding Expectancies in Cancer Symptom Management \(R01 Clinical Trial Required\)](#)

- Closing Date: **May 7, 2026**
- Description: This NOFO supports research on expectancy-generating factors and measures of their effects on expectancies and subsequent cancer symptom management outcomes; and research to identify moderators of such expectancy effects. Specifically, this NOFO will solicit mechanistic research that aims to understand how and why expectancy effects occur in a cancer context, elucidate their role in cancer symptom management, and identify patients, symptoms, cancer sites, and contexts in which expectancy effects can be leveraged to improve cancer outcomes.
- Eligibility: State governments; City or township governments; county governments; special district governments; Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized); Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments); Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; for profit organizations other than small businesses; small businesses; public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; public and state controlled institutions of

higher education; private institutions of higher education; independent school districts; see other eligible applicants in the full NOFO.

[Tobacco Regulatory Science Small Grant Program for New Investigators | R03 Clinical Trial Optional](#)

- Closing Date: **July 14, 2026**
- Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) aims to support new biomedical, behavioral, and social science investigators who are in the early stages of establishing independent careers in tobacco regulatory research. The R03 grant mechanism supports different types of projects, including pilot and feasibility studies, secondary analysis of existing data, small, self-contained research projects, development of research methodology, and development of new research technology. Applicants are encouraged to conduct projects that ultimately have the potential to inform regulations on tobacco product manufacturing, distribution, and marketing. Research projects must address one or more High-Priority Research Topic(s) related to the regulatory authority of the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Center for Tobacco Products (CTP) as mandated by the Family Smoking Prevention and Tobacco Control Act (FSPTCA), Public Law 111-31. The awards under this NOFO will be administered by NIH using funds made available through FDA CTP and the FSPTCA. Research results from this NOFO are expected to generate findings and data directly relevant to informing the FDA's regulation of the manufacture, distribution, and marketing of tobacco products to protect public health.
- Eligibility: Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, State governments, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments), Independent school districts, Private institutions of higher education, For profit organizations other than small businesses, Small businesses, County governments, Special district governments, Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities, City or township governments, Public and State controlled institutions of higher education, Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education.

Department of Housing and Urban Development

Capital Improvements for At-Risk/Receivership/Substandard/Troubled PHAs

- Closing Date: **April 28, 2026**
- Description: \$11,500,000 shall be to support the costs of administrative and judicial receiverships and for competitive grants to PHAs in receivership, designate troubled or substandard, or otherwise at risk, as determined by the Secretary, for costs associated with public housing asset improvement, in addition to other amounts for that purpose provided under any heading under this title.
- Eligibility: Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; see NOFO for more information.

Housing-Related Hazards and Lead-Based Paint Capital Fund Program

- Closing Date: **May 4, 2026**
- Description: The purpose of the HRH and LBP NOFO is to evaluate and reduce residential health hazards in public housing, including lead-based paint, carbon monoxide, mold, radon, and fire safety. Please see the full NOFO for additional information.
- Eligibility: Public Housing Agencies with the legal authority to develop, own, modernize, and operate a public housing project in accordance with the Act are eligible to apply. PHAs that are troubled are eligible for funding if the agency is in compliance with any current Memorandum of Agreement or Recovery Agreements. Individuals, foreign entities, and sole proprietorship organizations are not eligible to compete for, or receive, awards made under this announcement.

Department of Justice

Bureau of Justice Assistance: FY25 Second Chance Act Training & Technical Assistance Program

- Closing Date: **April 10, 2026**
- Description: This NOFO will support Second Chance Act grantees, with a particular focus on Smart Reentry program grantees, to assess community reentry strategies and implement or expand interventions to address identified gaps in technical areas to reduce recidivism and improve public safety, including

technology adoption and expansion to enhance reentry strategies, and statistical analysis support to inform and achieve identified objectives.

- Eligibility: Public and State controlled institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; for profit organizations other than small businesses.

Facilitator Training for Victim Offender Dialogue

- Closing Date: **April 17, 2026**
- Description: The National Institute of Corrections (NIC) is committed to strengthening the field of corrections by ensuring that agencies are equipped with the training, tools, and resources necessary to deliver post-conviction victim services effectively. Through this solicitation, the NIC seeks a provider to deliver (1) one blended basic training for new facilitators of victim-offender dialogue and (2) one blended advanced training focused on cases involving sexual assault. Together, these training courses will expand the capacity of state correctional agencies to meet victims' needs, foster healing, and enable victims to actively participate in repairing the harm caused to them.
- Eligibility: NIC invites applications from nonprofit organizations (including faith-based, community, and tribal organizations), for-profit organizations (including tribal for-profit organizations), and institutions of higher education (including tribal institutions of higher education). Recipients, including for-profit organizations, must agree to waive any profit or fee for services.

Bureau of Justice Assistance; FY25 Adult Treatment Court Program

- Closing Date: **April 27, 2026**
- Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity will support the implementation and enhancement of Adult Treatment Court (ATC) operations. ATCs integrate Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment, mandatory drug testing, incentives and sanctions, and transitional services in a judicially supervised criminal court setting that has jurisdiction over individuals with substance use disorders. These courts aim to reduce recidivism and overdose fatalities, while increasing access to treatment and recovery support that leads to long-term recovery.

- Eligibility: State governments, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), City or township governments, Others (see full Notice of Funding Opportunity for additional information), County governments.

Bureau of Justice Assistance: FY25 Veterans Treatment Court Program

- Closing Date: **April 27, 2026**
- Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity will support the implementation and enhancement of veterans treatment court (VTC) operations. VTCs connect justice-involved veterans to treatment for substance use disorders (SUD), mental health disorders (MHD), co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (MHSUD), post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and traumatic brain injury (TBI). Funding supports service coordination and recovery support services. VTCs integrate mandatory drug testing, incentives and sanctions, and transitional services in judicially supervised criminal court settings that have jurisdiction over veterans with behavioral health treatment needs. These courts aim to reduce recidivism and overdose fatalities, while increasing access to treatment and recovery support that leads to long-term recovery.
- Eligibility: Others (see full Notice of Funding Opportunity for additional information), Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), State governments, County governments, Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments), City or township governments.

Bureau of Justice Assistance: FY25 Second Chance Act Pay for Success Initiative

- Closing Date: **April 27, 2026**
- Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity supports the use of performance-based and outcomes-based contracting to implement or enhance programs and services to reduce recidivism, including to address housing needs of individuals leaving incarceration. Contracts may be newly created, expanded, or transitioned from direct payment to performance-based and outcomes-based and must serve individuals leaving incarceration with the goal of reducing recidivism and supporting long-term reentry success.
- Eligibility: State governments, City or township governments, Others (see full Notice of Funding Opportunity for additional information), Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Special district governments, Public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities, County governments.

Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention: FY25 Family Treatment Court Program

- Closing Date: **April 27, 2026**
- Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity will support state and local courts, units of local government, and federally recognized Tribal governments to establish new, enhance existing, or implement statewide or countywide family treatment courts to ensure the provision of substance use treatment and other services that improve child, parent, and family outcomes.
- Eligibility: State governments, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), City or township governments, Others (see full Notice of Funding Opportunity for additional information), County governments.

Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention: FY25 Juvenile Drug Treatment Court Program

- Closing Date: **April 27, 2026**
- Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity will support states, state and local courts, units of local government, and federally recognized Tribal governments to implement new and enhance existing juvenile drug treatment courts (JDTCs) to improve outcomes for youth with substance use disorders or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders.
- Eligibility: City or township governments, State governments, County governments, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized).

Community Reentry Settings Initiative

- Closing Date: **May 4, 2026**
- Description: The primary objective is to systematically examine the current decision-making point governing the process of prison residents' release to halfway houses. The process evaluation should aim to illuminate the operational realities and challenges in order for the National Institute of Corrections (NIC) to discern how those underlying factors can be changed and improved upon. By focusing on the "why" and "how" of this decision point, we will better understand halfway house placement implementation. Please note, this is NOT a funding opportunity to plan, establish, revise, fund, staff, or build a halfway house in any community. Please see the full NOFO for more information.
- Eligibility: NIC invites applications from nonprofit organizations (including faith-based, community, and tribal organizations), for-profit organizations, and

institutions of higher education. Recipients, including for-profit organizations, must agree to waive any profit or fee for services.

Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention: FY25 Family-Based Alternative Justice

- Closing Date: **May 4, 2026**
- Description: This NOFO will support the implementation of new, and enhance existing, family-based alternative sentencing programs for parents/primary caregivers who are involved or at risk for becoming involved in the criminal justice system. Through pre-arrest and pre-sentencing alternatives, these programs focus on rehabilitation, family unification, and family preservation. They help parents avoid incarceration, when appropriate, while strengthening their skills and capacity to care for their children long-term, and reducing the likelihood for children and parents/primary caregivers of future involvement in the juvenile or criminal justice systems.
- Eligibility: State governments; City or township governments; county governments; special district governments; Native American tribal organizations (Federally recognized); nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; for profit organizations other than small businesses; small businesses; units of local government.

Department of Labor

Employment and Training Administration: Pay-for-Performance (PfP) Incentive Pay Program

- Closing Date: **April 3, 2026**
- Description: The Program will focus on incentivizing the expansion and growth of the National Apprenticeship System, specifically in industries with a firmly established program infrastructure that will make a significant contribution to this Administration's goal of exceeding 1 million active apprentices. The designated industries are Shipbuilding and Defense Industrial Base; Artificial Intelligence (AI); Semiconductor and Nuclear Energy Infrastructure; Information Technology; Healthcare; Transportation; and Telecommunication.

- Eligibility: State governments; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; small businesses; for profit organizations other than small businesses; Public and State controlled institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; others (see the Funding Opportunity for specific eligibility requirements).

[The Reentry Employment in Skilled Trades, Advanced Manufacturing Registered Apprenticeships, and Training \(RESTART\) Initiative](#)

- Closing Date: **April 15, 2026**
- Description: RESTART supports the advancement of workforce readiness skills and the attainment of employment for ex-offenders across three populations: youth (ages 15-17 years old), young adults (ages 18-24 years old), and adults (ages 25 years old and above). Funds will be awarded to eligible entities to develop programs to train ex-offenders for high-need American jobs and assist them in being productive contributors to the U.S. economy.
- Eligibility: State governments; nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; Native American tribal governments (federally recognized); Native American tribal organizations (other than federally recognized); see funding opportunity for specific eligibility requirements.

[Talent Search Program](#)

- Closing Date: **May 1, 2026**
- Description: The Employment and Training Administration at the U.S. Department of Labor is soliciting applications in support of the administration of the Talent Search Program on behalf of the U.S. Department of Education. The purpose of the Talent Search Program is to identify qualified individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds with potential for education at the postsecondary level and encourage them to complete secondary school and undertake postsecondary education. Talent Search projects publicize the availability of, and facilitate the application for, student financial assistance for persons who seek to pursue postsecondary education, and encourage persons who have not completed

programs at the secondary or postsecondary level to enter or reenter and complete these programs.

Announcement of Stand Down Grants - Veterans Employment and Training Service

- Closing Date: **September 30, 2026**
- Description: The U.S. Department of Labor's (DOL) Veterans' Employment and Training Service (VETS) supports local Stand Down events that assist veterans experiencing homelessness by providing a wide range of employment, social, and health services. Stand Down is a military term referring to an opportunity to achieve a brief respite from combat. Troops assemble in a base camp to receive new clothing, hot food, support services, and a relative degree of safety before returning to combat action. A DOL VETS-funded Stand Down event serves a similar purpose; however, it is intended for veterans experiencing or at-risk of homelessness. The critical services provided at these events are often the catalyst that enables those individuals to reenter the workforce. VETS awards these noncompetitive grants on a first-come, first-served basis to support one-day or multi-day events at up to \$7,000 or \$10,000, respectively. They are collaborative events coordinated between VA, DOL, other federal, state, and local government agencies and community-based organizations providing services and supplies to veterans experiencing and at risk of homelessness.
- Eligibility: Nonprofit and for-profit entities; institutions of higher education; state and local workforce boards; public and tribal housing authorities; state, territory, county, city, local, and special districts; and tribal governments and agencies.

Department of Transportation

FY 2026 All Stations Accessibility Program

- Closing Date: **May 1, 2026**

- Description: The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) announces the opportunity to apply for \$686 million in competitive grants for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 All Stations Accessibility Program (ASAP) under Assistance Listing Number 20.533. This is an initial announcement for the FY 2025 and FY 2026 rounds of this program. As required by Federal public transportation law, funds will be awarded competitively for any purpose eligible under Division J of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (Pub.L. 117-58) for capital and planning projects to upgrade the accessibility of legacy rail fixed guideway public transportation systems for people with disabilities.
- Eligibility: State governments; City or township governments; county governments. See NOFO for more information.

[Natural Gas Distribution Infrastructure Safety and Modernization \(NGDISM\) Grant Program](#)

- Closing Date: **May 22, 2026**
- Description: The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) was signed into law on November 15, 2021. The law created the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration's (PHMSA) first ever infrastructure grant program. The Natural Gas Distribution Infrastructure Safety and Modernization (NGDISM) grant program is designated \$220 million a year in grant funding with a total of \$1 billion in grant funding over five years. The grant funding is to be made available to a municipality or community owned utility (not including for-profit) entities to repair, rehabilitate, or replace its natural gas distribution pipeline systems or portions thereof, or to acquire equipment to (1) reduce incidents and fatalities and (2) to avoid economic losses.
- Eligibility: City or township governments; Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized); County governments; Special district governments; Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; Others (See full NOFO for more information).

[Safe Streets and Roads for All Funding Opportunity](#)

- Closing Date: **May 26, 2026**
- Description: The purpose of this notice is to solicit applications for Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grants. Funds for the fiscal year (FY) 2026 SS4A grant program are to be awarded on a competitive basis to support planning and demonstration activities, as well as projects and strategies to prevent death and

serious injury on roads and streets for all users. There are Planning and Demonstration Grants and Implementation Grants.

- Eligibility: City or township governments; Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized); County governments; Special district governments; Public and State controlled institutions of higher education; Independent school districts; Others (See full NOFO for more information).

Grants for Adaptive Sports Programs for Disabled Veterans and Disabled Members of the Armed Forces

- Closing Date: **May 13, 2026**
- Description: The VA National Veterans Sports Program Special Events Program announces the availability of up to \$16,000,000 (subject to the availability of Federal funds) for the VA Adaptive Sports Grant Program. VA will award grants to qualifying organizations to plan, develop, manage, and implement programs to provide adaptive sports, training, and other opportunities for Veterans and members of the Armed Forces with disabilities.
- Eligibility: County governments; Public and State controlled institutions of higher education; Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized); Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; City or township governments; State governments; Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education; Independent school districts; Private institutions of higher education; Small businesses; Special district governments; Individuals; Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments); For profit organizations other than small businesses.

Environmental Protection Agency

National Environmental Education and Training Program

- Closing Date: **April 27, 2026**
- Description: The National Environmental Education and Training Program is authorized under Section 5 of the National Environmental Education Act of 1990 (Public Law 101-619). The purpose of this program is to deliver environmental

education (EE) training and long-term support to formal and non-formal education professionals across the U.S. in the development and delivery of environmental education and training programs and studies, bolstering their ability to effectively teach about environmental issues.

- Eligibility: Eligibility for funding is open to U.S. institutions of higher education, not-for-profit institutions as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 which are exempt from taxation pursuant to provisions of section 501(a) of such Code, or a consortium of such institutions may apply to this program.

National Endowment for the Humanities

State and Jurisdictional Humanities Councils General Operating Support Grants

- Closing Date: **April 6, 2026**
- Description: The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Division of Federal/State Partnership is accepting applications for State and Jurisdictional Humanities Councils General Operating Support Grants for NEH's designated humanities councils. State and jurisdictional humanities councils tailor their grantmaking and programs to the needs, resources, and interests of their state or jurisdiction, while also extending the reach of NEH-funded projects and further strengthening the agency's connection to local communities. NEH determines annual funding for each state and jurisdictional humanities council according to a statutory formula.
- Eligibility: The only eligible applicants are the independent, nonprofit 501(c)(3) state and jurisdictional humanities councils.

Awards for Faculty at HBCUs

- Closing Date: **April 22, 2026**
- Description: NEH Awards for Faculty are grants to individual faculty members at HBCUs pursuing projects that embody exceptional humanistic research, rigorous analysis, and clear writing. Applications must clearly articulate a project's value to humanities scholars, general audiences, or both. These awards provide recipients with time to write, to travel, and to conduct research and other project-related activities. Projects are eligible at any stage. This program offers applicants flexibility in project outcomes and award periods. The 2026 Awards for Faculty

competition will accept only projects for research in American history and culture and Western civilization.

- Eligibility: Individuals are the only eligible applicants.

NEH Fellowships

- Closing Date: **April 22, 2026**
- Description: NEH Fellowships are grants to individual scholars pursuing projects that embody exceptional humanistic research, rigorous analysis, and clear writing. Applications must clearly articulate a project's value to humanities scholars, general audiences, or both. These awards provide recipients with time to write, to travel, and to conduct research and other project-related activities. NEH encourages submissions from independent scholars and junior scholars. Projects are eligible at any stage. The 2026 Fellowships competition will accept only projects for research in American history and culture and Western civilization.
- Eligibility: Individuals are the only eligible applicants.

National Science Foundation

NSF's Eddie Bernice Johnson Inclusion across the Nation of Communities of Learners of Underrepresented Discoverers in Engineering and Science (INCLUDES) Initiative

- Closing Date: **May 12, 2026**
- Description: The INCLUDES initiative is a comprehensive, national effort to enhance U.S. leadership in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) discovery and innovation, focused on NSF's commitment to ensuring accessibility and inclusivity in STEM fields, as communicated in the NSF Strategic Plan for Fiscal Years (FY) 2022-2026. The vision of the INCLUDES Initiative is to catalyze the STEM enterprise to work collaboratively for inclusive change, resulting in a STEM workforce that reflects the Nation's population. More specifically, the INCLUDES Initiative seeks to motivate and accelerate collaborative infrastructure building to sustain systemic change to broaden participation in STEM fields at scale. Significant advancement of the INCLUDES Initiative's goals will result in a new generation of STEM talent and leadership to secure the Nation's future and long-term economic competitiveness.
- Eligibility: For-profit organizations: U.S.-based commercial organizations, including small businesses, with strong capabilities in scientific or engineering research or

education and a passion for innovation; Non-profit, non-academic organizations: independent museums, observatories, research laboratories, professional societies and similar organizations located in the U.S. that are directly associated with educational or research activities; State and local governments-Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs): two- and four-year IHEs (including community colleges) accredited in, and having a campus located in the U.S., acting on behalf of their faculty members; Tribal nations: An American Indian or Alaska Native tribe, band, nation, pueblo, village, or community that the Secretary of the Interior acknowledges as a federally recognized tribe pursuant to the Federally Recognized Indian Tribe List Act of 1994, 25 U.S.C. §§ 5130-5131.
